A PASTORAL LETTER "The Christ Centered Spirituality of Bonhoeffer" What does it mean to be the church today? Or as Bonhoeffer would say, "Who is Christ for us today?" Pastor Tim Swanson

I have been a reader of Dietrich Bonhoeffer since my seminary days. I have come across a simple book written by a Lutheran pastor from Minnesota that provides a brief outline reflecting on Bonhoeffer's perceptions of where the church needed to move. Here is a brief description that can be centerpiece for each of the five weeks of Lent.

Bonhoeffer was baptized in the church but really did not grow up in it. His father was a liberal thinking psychologist who did not see its need; but tolerated the Christian belief. His mother was influenced by a Moravian Brethren governess. Yet, Bonhoeffer received his Ph.D. when he was 21 and wrote his dissertation for that degree on the church as "Communion of Saints". He became a profound defender of the church as a community of believers. While he was imprisoned by the Nazis, his reflections grew to how the church must be actively engaged within the world. Here is an outline of what would be regarded as 5 crumbling pillars which he believed prevented the church from being challenged to enter this new world view, as well as his 5 challenged for the church fo



lenges for the church for the future. We are living in that future today.

First: The crumbling pillar: the "individualism" of a private faith.

The new pillar needed: the church is Christ existing as community (baptism is not a private transaction and holy communion is not to be seen as a private reception of forgiveness apart from the community).

Second: The crumbling pillar: the remote "otherness of God".

The new pillar needed: the God "beyond is in the midst of life" (God is in the center of life, not at the end of ours: the incarnation of Jesus and the Cross are central issues)

Third: The crumbling pillar: religious practices that foster distance from the world (God is found only in prayer, worship, meditation etc.)

The new pillar needed: making Christ's presence in the church "for" the world through prayer and action (the church cannot be self-centered or self-serving)

Fourth: The crumbling pillar: Christianity cannot be a religion of the privileged. (mankind's religiosity causes one to look for God's power in the world)

The new pillar needed: God's kingdom and Christ's suffering for the world needs to be the focus of Christian discipleship and not the individual person's life, loves, and problems (the challenge is to be a disciple of Christ: ask not what God can do for you but what you can do for God)

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Fifth: The crumbling pillar: immature overdependency: leaning on God for things that humans are able to do for themselves and others (the goal: for mature thinking, deciding and acting responsibly in an interdependent way)


The new pillar needed: here Bonhoeffer lifted up his famous "world come of age" saying. The world has made many advancements in science and technology etc. He saw these advancements, etc. as God-willed. The church needs to see God as the center of all of life (not just the church). It calls for the Christian to live maturely and responsibly within this context.

So, these five pillars are necessary for the church to be challenged today and in the future:

- 1) Christ existing as community
- 2) God as the beyond in our midst
- 3) God claiming the whole world
- 4) Christian faith as life lived for others, and
- 5) in a world come of age.

These are reflections for the five weeks of Lent for Wednesdays evenings.



Devotion was led by Pastor Tim.

November, 2022 minutes were read by the council president. There were no questions or comments. All those present approved/accepted the November minutes.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: It was noted that CD interest rates are expected to rise in January. Part of Accrued balance could be placed in three CDs with varying maturity dates to remain flexible.

Committees

Pastor Tim's Report

 He also presented a "Missional model for expanding the vision" and quoted Acts 2:42 as a biblical model. The goal is to move the mission of the church beyond ourselves and our own territory by learning the 'how' to do this.
- Pastor Tim would like to have an Invitational Event with Stephen's Ministry and St. John's Council. We agreed the date of February 11 at 10:00 am works well. The book "The Invitational Christian" written by Dave Daubert will have hopefully been read by all before the meeting.
- Pastor will be leading an Ash Wednesday service Feb. 22 and Wednesday Lenten/Healing services each week on March 1, 8, 15, 22, 29. (services start at 7:00 pm)
- He will be starting a Bible study on Paul's use of his triad Faith, Hope, and Love. During Lent will begin a study of 1 Peter.
- Looking into the possibility of pursuing a relationship with Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Germantown
